#### **Show Racism the Red Card**

On the last day of half term in October 2022, we were invited to wear something red to school for Wear Red Day, to raise awareness and encourage young people to challenge racism in society and break down barriers. The sum raised through donations was £620.60.

Founded in 1996 by Newcastle United goalkeeper, Shaka Hislop, Show Racism the Red Card are a charity that deliver educational workshops to young people and adults in schools, workplaces and football stadium events.

Across the UK, SRtRC works with more than 50,000 individuals a year and, as of January 2023, it is fast approaching the 1 million mark of the number of people reached.

The money raised in schools across the country will help the charity continue in their efforts to educate against racism.

We are excited to share with you some great news about the success of our sports teams at Westbourne Academy. So far this year we have had tremendous success with our teams achieving great results in various competitions.

We have been competitive in a range of sports, including football, netball, basketball, futsal, cross-country and sportshall athletics. Success has been seen across the age range and across boys and girls teams.

All of our boys and girls football teams successfully navigated the early rounds of the County Cup. The U15s are the only team to remain in the competition, with a recent nail-biting win over East Bergholt High, that went to penalties. They await to see who their opponents are in the semi-finals. Our U12 boys and U13 girls were winners of their Futsal rounds and look forward to competing in the Ipswich and District finals later in March. For the first time, Westbourne has been able to field an U16 boys basketball team as a result of their

The audience was filled with extremely proud parents and carers watching the sheer amount of talent within Westbourne academy.


Its so nice to be able to go back into schools and see just how nurtured and supported our children are and witness for ourselves how much their talents have developed!!


# Year 9 History Trip ...



On Thursday 2 February, sixty-five Year 9 history students departed Westbourne Academy at 7.15am to travel to the Imperial War Museum in London. Despite being a six -hour round trip, students were pleased to see many of London's landmarks on the journey. These included locations they had learned about in their history lessons such as the Tower of London, the Houses of Parliament and even a coach ride on the Embankment above Joseph Bazalgette's world renowned sewer system!

On arrival at the museum students were split into two groups. Each group was able to visit the World War One, World War Two and Cold War displays in the museum, as well as to take part in a self-guided tour of the Holocaust Gallery.

In the main museum, students were able to look at different vehicles, weapons and objects used in warfare across the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Highlights included a reconstruction of a World War One trench and the impressive atrium which contained exhibits ranging from a British Spitfire and a Japanese Kamikaze aircraft, both suspended from the ceiling, to a V2 rocket and the remains of a Baghdad car bomb. The exhibits also brought home to students the brutality and devastation of war.



The most moving part of the day was the visit to the Holocaust Gallery. After a learning session with museum facilitators, students were given a tablet which prompted them with a series of questions so they could engage more deeply with the items in the exhibition. As student Sadia Ahmed from Ramsey House noted, 'the postcards and letters that were displayed were really emotional because some were never delivered and found. It reminded me that people would write letters from the camps, hoping to one day be reunited with their families but never were.' After visiting the gallery everyone was asked to reflect on what they had learned and the museum's educators were impressed with the quality of discussion provided by Westbourne students.

Thank you to Mr Archer, Miss Chetty, Mr Gowing and Mr Fulford, who contributed to making the trip so successful and rewarding for all involved.

# Culture Capital ...



"A golden thread, woven through everything you do to teach children well"

(Ofsted Chief inspector Amanda Spielman called cultural capital)

**So what is it?** It is the "learned experience of the child: formal, informal, within the classroom and beyond." Culture Capital is about exposing students to a large variety of subject areas and arts; promoting character-building qualities that lead to creating well-rounded, global citizens, and of course the more typical expectation of education, which is to provide young people with recognised and meaningful qualifications that will open up doors to paths in later life. Basically, the more culture capital students are exposed to, the more powerful they become!

What should that learned experience be? First and foremost, a broad, balanced and carefully planned curriculum. It is about during discrete lessons, VT themed discussions and assemblies, celebrating all types of diversity; to prepare students for life in modern Britain; learning about different cultures within our community and those communities students have no prior experience of, so they will learn to value each other's cultures and those they will encounter in society as well as their own.

How is culture capital integrated into student life at Westbourne? Each week in tutor time, a specific topic is identified for discussion based on current affairs, world events or awareness days. In assemblies throughout the year students hear about a range of topics such as loyalty, resilience, Remembrance Day, Harmful Sexual Behaviour and Safeguarding, Positive Mindset and why healthy choices are important. As a community we also mark various worldwide and nationwide awareness weeks such as Road Safety Week, Mental Health Awareness Week, Young Carers, Heroes, World Poetry Week, School Diversity Week and Hello Yellow Day.

Our community support for charitable causes is also another great way in which students and staff have come together throughout the year to do something positive for those less fortunate than themselves: MacMillan Cake Sale, Rainbow Friday, Christmas Jumper Day, the Big Litter Pick, Show Racism the Red Card Day, The Big Hoot and in 2022, the DEC Appeal for Ukraine.

What is the value of extra-curricular experiences and trips? Giving students the opportunity to join in with extra-curricular clubs, sports events, House competitions and go on trips out of school adds to their cultural experiences. Through our core values of STAR and LORIC, students develop their character, learn about social norms, recognise that as young adults they need to sometimes show leadership skills, be well organised, be resilient to challenge and change, be independent and also communicate well.

# 100% Club ...

This academic year, following lots of student voice feedback, we are aiming to ensure that we are rewarding our students in as many different ways as we can when they exhibit the academy core and aspirational values of STAR and LORIC.

One such example has been the introduction of our '100% Club'. The 'club' meets every half term and in order to become a member you need to have had both 100% attendance to school for the last half term period, in addition to also displaying 100% positive behaviour.

In October, 230 students were eligible to attend our first meeting and they were treated to a Friday afternoon of Dominos pizza, donuts and drink in the hall to celebrate their great achievement.

In December, 180 students from across the five year groups were eligible to attend for half term two and, despite the cold weather and various illnesses doing the rounds in early 2023, 170 students will be attending the third meeting of the 100% Club next week.

Every half term the count starts again, so each and every student has six chances a year to be eligible for the reward. Congratulations to all of our 100% Club members so far, particularly those who have attended on multiple occasions.



#### What is Mental Health First Aid?

Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) is an internationally recognised training course, designed to teach people how to spot the signs and symptoms of mental ill health and provide help on a first aid basis.

At MHFA England we offer a range of courses tailored for people who teach, work, live with and care for young people aged 8 to 18. The courses can be attended by anyone from age 16 upwards. Each and every MHFA England course is delivered by a quality assured instructor.

#### Youth MHFA Two Day course

Completing our two day course qualifies you as a **Youth Mental Health First Aider**. Youth Mental Health First Aiders have:

- An in depth understanding of young people's mental health and factors that affect wellbeing
- Practical skills to spot the triggers and signs of mental health issues
- Confidence to reassure and support a young person in distress
- Enhanced interpersonal skills such as non-judgemental listening
- Knowledge to help a young person recover their health by guiding them to further support - whether that's through self-help sites, their place of learning, the NHS, or a mix - engaging with parents, carers and external agencies where appropriate
- Ability to support a young person with a long term mental health issue or disability to thrive
- Tools to look after your own mental wellbeing

The course is delivered in four manageable

- Depression and anxiety
- Suicide and psychosis
- Self-harm and eating disorders

It focuses on the issues faced by young people today, such as cyber bullying and substance misuse, and teaches how to promote protective factors and good parenting.

Everyone who completes the course gets a Youth MHFA manual to refer to whenever they need it, and a certificate to say they are a Youth Mental Health First Aider.
